

ometic recently expanded its recall on a population of two-door refrigerators. The original recall included some two-door refrigerators manufactured between April 1997 and May 2003. The new recall focuses on models manufactured between June 2003 and September 2006. I just found out today our refrigerator is affected, so I thought I would get the word out. Fantastic Fan Upgrades Available

f all the gadgets in our Tetons, one that seems to be most useful is the Fantastic Vent. Many Tetons include two or more. Depending on model, the vents include thermostats and rain sensors. In addition, as many RVers will attest, the Fantastic Vent company is one of the most customer responsive should a problem occur. What more could we ask?

Well, it seems that the company has been listening to us. They have introduced a new fan/vent, the 6600, that has two new features most of us would like. And being the customer responsive company that they are, Fantastic Vent has designed the changes to be "backward compatible" so that we aren't forced to discard our current vents just to get the new features.

The first new item is called the "Pop 'N Lock" screen. It replaces the existing screen that is screwed into place. Anyone who has unscrewed the screen knows that the job is not only awkward, it is also easy to strip the plastic threads in a moment of too much torque. The replacement screen



merely clips into place and is easily removed for cleaning.

I bought our screens on-line from Rvdirect.com for \$12.83 (for a set of two screens), however, many retail camping stores will soon carry this "better idea."

Another new feature on the top of the line model 6600 vent, is an electronic fan control, which includes an RF (TV-type) remote control. The remote comes with a wall



storage cradle. It provides 14 speed settings on manual mode, or automatic variable speeds when in thermostat-control mode. This feature was developed for RVs (like our Tetons) that have Fantastic fans

mounted on high ceilings, unreachable without standing on a counter or chair. And best of all, it's also backward compatible and will retro-fit older units. Bit pricey, the upgrade kits run about \$170.00.

Got Space?

hat do you do when you've filled every nook and cranny of every cabinet in your coach? You build more cabinets, of course. Well, maybe not "you," but you find someone who can.

That's what we did in May. After a great NE TCI rally in Springfield, we headed to Dover, Ohio and Woodi Cronebach's (#1264) workshop. We had admired his work at previous rallies, and he agreed to make us a couple of cabinets.

The first project was a small cabinet to fit over the window in the bathroom. It's a small space, but just large enough to hold that pesky bottle of black water chemicals and various other items.



A new "medicine cabinet" was installed in the lavatory room, above the window.

The living room was the scene of the next project. Woodi has a handy cabinet behind his recliners, which we originally thought would work for us. Eventually, we decided a sideboard behind the dining table would be more useful. Woodi was willing to build any design we wanted, so we opted for a 6'L x 2'H x 1'D cabinet with sliding front panels and a drop leaf top.

The projects took about a week, which gave us a chance to visit with Woodi and Shirley as we were parked next to them in their driveway.

All went well, and we were soon on to the next challenge -

staining the cabinets. That's a whole other story, but eventually we took samples of our present cabinets and the unfinished wood to Sherwin-Williams and they were able to match the stain.



This sideboard/cabinet was installed in the dining area. The table top is taller than the sideboard to allow for storage compactness.

The cabinets meet all our expectations, and the dining table moves over the cabinet when the slide is closed, so everything fits together neatly. We're already anticipating more projects, but those will have to wait until our next trip to Ohio.



Want to install a rectangular flat screen TV in the somewhat square standard TV opening? Here's how we did it without major "deconstruction of the existing cabinet framing.

y wife has always had this thing for big screen TVs. I know it is usually the guy who wants this—Honestly, it was all her idea. But ideas don't get the TV installed.

The first thing we did was to remove all the components from their original location in the entertainment center. I then removed all the wires by pulling them into the refrigerator opening on the exterior and then routed them down and into the lower cupboard where the sub-woofer resides. You do not have to remove the components to do this project but we wanted all the storage space we were going to get from moving them.

I next removed the keyboard tray behind the fold down drawer front at the desk. We do not use this tray so it was a good open air place to install the components. Then I installed a white metal shelf cut to size from Lowes. This is where I reinstalled the Bose, the TiVo and the switch box

for cable and antenna TV. This location works best if all your components can be controlled by RF rather than IR. If you only have IR ability (*I.e. must point the remote directly at the TV*), you could cut in a smoke glass panel into the drawer front.

To install the TV, I had to build an oak frame that would cover the entire opening where the old TV and components used to be. Before doing that, we actually had to choose our TV so I knew where to place the supports for the mounting holes on the frame I was building. We chose a 42" LCD from Costco.

Once the frame was built and stained, I obtained a door quality piano hinge from a friend who installs doors for a living and cut it to size to mount the frame to the unit. I removed the original glass door and drilled some pilot holes to mount the piano hinge with the frame and TV attached.



This is the oak frame that covers the original TV and component cabinets. Center uprights are placed so that the new TV can be mounted on to the front of the frame.

I then went to a local RV store and purchased gas shocks like those found on our exterior cargo doors. They also had the little mounting brackets to attach the shocks to the cabinet. The total weight of the TV and frame was approximately 50 lbs. I purchased two shocks rated for 80 pounds of lift.

Once installed, the entire frame and TV pivot easily towards the ceiling and allow access to the entire space behind it for storage.

Finally, I used a hole saw and drilled a hole in the right front corner of the desk top and a corresponding hole in the bottom of the entertainment center. This is how I routed the HDMI and other cables back up to the TV. The cables are zipped tied and stay out of site in the corner.

We installed another metal shelf about half way up where the old TV used to be and now have added a tremendous amount of storage along with a pretty spiffy HDTV.

HDTV Install Part 2 the Cable Guy

f you are thinking about installing an HDTV in your coach, one of the issues you will face is the need for two Satellite hookups on the outside of your unit if it is a bit older. Ours is a 2003 Grand and only had one hookup, so like many folks; we ran a skinny white cable adapter through the window and to the TiVo. When I installed our HDTV, I decided to tackle this issue as well. It should be noted that I extracted all the cables from the overhead entertainment center and routed them down the refrigerator opening and into the lower cupboard where the Bose sub-woofer is. If you want to leave all your components in their original installed position, then you will have to snake the cable up the refrigerator opening and over to your components. But I'm getting ahead of myself.

Our coach is a 36' model. I purchased 50 feet of coax ca-




Finished cabinet with mounted TV is held open with gas shocks.

ble for the project and it was just enough. More would be needed if you are going to route it up to the original location of the components. You will also need two female ends for each end of the cable and two male-male HDTV nipples for the little access panel where you currently hook up the satellite etc. You will have to replace the nipple that is currently there with an HDTV compatible one as well as installing the second one. You will also need to go to your local RV store and purchase a small amount of "underbelly" tape as you will be making a small cut into the fabric to get the cable out at the back of the unit.

Because you have to worry about the slide out moving in and out, you cannot just drop through the floor and out to the access panel. The cable has to move in and out and stay safe. So, starting in the lower cupboard, allow enough cable to get to the spot needed to hook up to your HDTV TiVo. Now remove every bottom drawer you have and take out all the stuff under your kitchen sink to allow you to get in there. Route your cable behind all the drawers and into the compartment where the hot water heater resides. From there you want to take it over the wall where Teton did and into the little area behind the wood grate next to the steps. Follow the flow of the cables that are already

there and zip tie the cable to the original cables. Feed the cable into the underbelly of the unit through the same opening Teton used. That was the easy part. You are now ready for the hard part.

of the unit in front of the axles there are three access compartments that have screws and removable panels. You will need to open all three of these to move the cable along towards the back of the coach. With one person inside and the other at the front panel, fish the cable through the floor and pull it out of the first access hole. Have your friend come out and go to the next opening and fish the cable to him. Repeat for the third panel. You should now have the cable just in front of the axle. Now, you need to go to the back corner of the unit and slice a small access hole into the fabric. Insert a 10' piece of conduit along the outside wall past the holding tanks and wires until your friend sees it in front of the axle. Tape the cable to the conduit and pull it out the back of the coach.

At this point you need to remove the cable from the back of the existing satellite connection and drill a hole for the additional connection. Note, I got mine a little close to the latch arm location so bear this in mind as you position the second connection. Install the additional HDTV connector into the panel. Now, route the new cable along the same path as the existing cable. Put your female end on it and screw it to the back of the male connection. Remove the old male connection and replace it with the new HDTV version and re attach the existing cable as well. Use the underbelly tape to seal up the hole made for the conduit. It should be noted that there was a lot of grunting and a few bad words needed to complete this project. You should be good to go.

Thursday night included a trip to the Farmer's market in San Luis Obispo—Good-looking fresh vegetables and good food booths.



Install an Autoformer Inside Your Rig

his is my latest project. The Autoformer is mounted on the wall, close to the switch box. The shore power is wired to the 50 amp. female plug. The 5 foot long power cord with the installation kit is wired into the switch box. The Autoformer is plugged into the shore power plug, the output of the Autoformer is fed to the switch box. The Autoformer weighs 40 pounds so please note that it is fastened with self tapping machine screws to the tubular metal support for the bedroom floor. If the Autoformer needs to be removed for any reason, just unplug the 2 fifty amp plugs, remove the Autoformer and plug the shore power and the switch together, then you are back to original installation.

NE Visits Ohio Caverns

We have just finished another great NE Teton rally in Ohio. On Tuesday, May 6, we caravanned to the Ohio Caverns near West Liberty, Ohio. These caverns were discovered as a sink hole in a pasture in 1897. Through the efforts of the farm owner, and with help of the local farmers that he employed in the off season, mud was cleaned out of the caverns. It was an ideal workplace as the temperature remains a constant 54 degrees. There are in excess of three miles of underground passages, with about one mile of it being used for tours at present time. There are steps down into the caverns and 66 steps coming out of the caverns.

At part of the tour, we are over 100 feet below ground, because of the elevation changes above ground. The entire one mile underground tour is narrated by an excellent local guide who is very knowledgeable and accommodating. It is very easy walking and accessible, (unless you happen to be over 6 feet tall) in which case, you have to duck a lot, or else get bumps on your "noggin."

The lighting was redone a few years ago by a professional electrical company out of Tennessee, which specializes in caves and caverns. The lighting is superb and helps to accentuate the natural beauty of these caverns. It was a great experience and some of us improved on the trip by stopping at the DQ on the way home.
