Get Your RV Unstuck –

t's only a matter of time until you and your Teton get stuck. It could be in a campground, out "boon docking," or even in a friend's front yard. Ideally, the best tool for getting unstuck is a towing service card, complete with phone number. Unfortunately, there are various reasons why this option is not available, or is not chosen by the stuck RVer. For cases like this, I always carry a folding military-type spade, and a heavy duty tow strap. Here are some suggestions adapted from the professionals, and "offroaders."

hitching to the trailer.

- 8. Use all the resources at your disposal. These include all areas behind or in front of the wheels that are firm (push the vehicle in that direction), a slight slope (gravity can be a major ally). Sometimes pulling out backwards is better than trying to continue forward.
- Look out for things that will hinder progress. These include a slight slope (gravity can also be an enemy), front and rear wheels dropping into a ditch simultaneously (arrange things so that wheels drop alternately).



Rules for Vehicle Recovery

- 1. Stop spinning your wheels the moment it appears you are stuck. Trying too hard only makes things more difficult. Every unnecessary rotation of the wheels digs the vehicle in deeper.
- 2. Establish if any part of the vehicle or trailer's weight (if connected) is resting on anything other than the wheels. If so jack up the vehicle or trailer and correct this first.
- 3. Take a close look at all drive wheels and establish which one is halting progress. Work on this wheel first.
- 4. Take a second look at each wheel. Any other wheels that do not have a clear path ahead of them must be worked on next.
- 5. Do not be tempted to try to drive out after a halfhearted attempt to de-bog the tow vehicle. Failure means that all the work done the first time will have to be redone.
- 6. If forward motion is not successful. try gently rocking the truck forward and backward.
- 7. If you are seriously bogged down, it may be necessary to unhook the trailer, pull out the truck, then repair the surface or use "sand ladders," stone, etc. before re-

- 10. Never use a tow ball with a winch or snatch strap. Should it break it will become a lethal missile.
- 11. Always lay a jacket, burlap bag, carpet, or other suitable material over a chain, winch cable or kinetic strap to minimize damage and dampen "fly-back" if the tow line breaks.

Using a Spade

If you are bogged down, and at least one tire is in a rut or hole, you will probably have to dig yourself out. Off road clubs claim that 90% of all recoveries need some digging and clearing of the path in front of the drive tires. In many cases, a little digging is all that is needed. I carry a threefold, military shovel. It takes up very little room and works great. It can even be set up in a "hoe" mode for chopping.

Using a Kinetic Strap

Sometimes known as a "Tuggum" or "Snatch Strap," kinetic straps stretch as the tow vehicle moves forward to pull out the bogged down vehicle. These straps are dangerous, but highly effective. If you or a friend uses one of these to pull out a stuck rig, always stay out of the "line of fire" in case the highly stretched strap should break.


Rules for Vehicle Recovery

Important Rules for using Kinetic Straps:

- 1. Do not use the snatch strap if the vehicle is badly bogged i.e. with its weight resting on its chassis. Use a jack and spade to put the weight back onto the wheels first.
- 2. The pulling vehicle must be similar in size and weight to the vehicle being pulled.
- 3. The pulling vehicle must run in a straight line. Do not attempt to pull at an angle of more than 10°.
- 4. Use bow-shackles to attach the snatch strap to the vehicles.
- 5. Always use safety loops on both ends.
- 6. Do not compromise on the security of attachment points. Use tow "eyes" or hooks if the vehicle is fitted with them.
- 7. Attach the kinetic strap to the front or back of the bogged vehicle. Consider first which will be the most effortless direction of travel.

Recovery Procedures

1. Maneuver the recovery vehicle to the bogged vehicle and stop at a point no less than half the total length of the snatch strap.



- 2. Attach the snatch strap to the bogged vehicle, making sure that there are no knots in the strap.
- 3. Lay a blanket over the strap or attach a safety line (ski rope is ideal). In the case of the strap breaking the weight of the blanket will rapidly absorb the energy of the broken strap.
- 4. With a go-ahead signal from the driver of the bogged vehicle, the recovery vehicle moves off at normal takeoff speed in first gear. Accelerate very gently and keep the speed constant. As the pull of the rope is felt, try to maintain a constant speed and continue to accelerate very gently – it is not engine power and torque that are doing the work, but the vehicle's momentum and energy transferred through the elasticity of the strap.



A snatch strap is a handy emergency item to carry in your RV or truck. I purchased mine at Western Sling Co. on Skyview Drive (just off the Old Salt Creek Hwy.) in Casper, WY.

Having the towing vehicle move off with excessive speed does not increase the pulling force. However, doubling the length of the strap together with a higher speed does have the desired result. To do this a joint must be made linking the two straps. UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES join two straps together with shackles or chain. Should one strap break the shackles or chain become a deadly missile.

Never have a <u>light vehicle</u> try to 'snatch' a heavy vehicle that is deeply bogged. It may recoil and hit the bogged vehicle.

> Never have a heavy vehicle try to 'snatch' a light vehicle that is <u>deeply bogged</u>. It could tear the small vehicle apart. When "off-roaders" get together, there is no shortage of stories about axles and frames being torn apart during recovery. Even if you are stuck and choose to call for a heavy-duty wrecker, don't let them pull you out of a deeply bogged (down to the axle) mess, without doing some digging first.

One Final Thought—The best way to getting unstuck, is to not get into the situation in the first place. Trust your gut—if you have a bad feeling about driving or camping in a suspicious area, don't do it. Ask for another campsite, take another route, park down hill, or do what it takes to prevent a likely "getting stuck" situation.

Ventilate Your Entertainment Center

This is a follow-up to the "Heat in Entertainment Cabinet" tech tip in the May, 2007 issue.

e had a similar heat problem with the RCA Home Theater compartment in our 2007 Frontier. With the previous article in mind, we removed our door's glass and then carefully removed the decorative lead trim from it. We used a slender knife so as not to bend or break the lead. We then put the lead piece back in the opening and hot glued it in place. Next, we cut a square of plastic screen larger than the opening and hot glued it to the inside of the door. If the stapler had been handy we might have stapled it in place instead.

This turned out so well we looked for other uses for the left over screen. We soon discovered we could just install screen over the backs of the other glass doors in the living room so they would match the first door. The bonus was that black screen lessened the visibility of the cabinets' contents. Some of you may have decorator items behind those glass doors, but we use them for storage that tends to be unsightly.

As far as the type of screen to use, Home Depot has several different options. We selected a heavy duty screen door replacement plastic promoted for use in homes with dogs. It was more expensive than regular screen door screen, but it was also a heavier gauge and superior in design.

If you try this, don't use electrician's tape to hold down the screen or cover up staples. While it's black and will match, it doesn't stick very well to plastic. (The interior decorator in the family thought it was a good idea, but the electrician in the family knew better.)

Special Events Manager, Sharon Stevens, coordinates this list and places a paper ornament on the Tree representing each child.

During Christmas In The Valley, folks can stop by the Tree Of Love (located this year in the lobby of the New Barn) and see the children's names, ages on the ornaments and make a donation. Actually, donations for the Tree Of Love come in all year in several ways. For instance, donations made to the Renfro Valley Shuttle go to the Tree of Love and folks fill piggy banks located throughout the property. In fact, every time you hear the church bell ring in Renfro Village, a needy child will receive a Christmas gift due to a donation made in our Freedom Church. The Special Events staff uses these donations to shop for each individual child. Each gift is wrapped and delivered




Another Old Teton "Park Model" Found – Still In Good Shape!



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


